Environmental History and Major Milestones

- 1958 Construction of General Motors and Reynolds Metals upstream of Akwesasne
- 1960 Moses-Saunders Dam and St Lawrence Seaway fully operational
- 1976 Discovery of fluoride contamination on Cornwall Island
- 1979 SRMT Environmental Health Program started under Health Services
- 1983 Environment Division becomes its own department
- 1984 General Motors added to National Priority List extreme risk to health and environment
- 1986 SRMT Health Services issue broad fish consumption moratorium (women and children)
- 1986-89 Studies on PCB Contamination of breastmilk in Akwesasne women
- 1987 St. Lawrence River designated Area of Concern by Intl. Joint Commission
- 1989 SRMT passes own cleanup standards for Polychlorinated Biphenyls (PCBs)
- 1990 Sloan and Jock report on extensive contamination of local fish and wildlife
- 1999 Operation Salt initiated to track groundwater contamination
- 2001 SRMT and EPA sign first Performance Partnership Agreement to support programs
- 2005 Opening of the Solid Waste Transfer Station with in land claim
- 2007 Federally enforceable Water Quality Standards under the Clean Water Act
- 2007 Tribal Implementation Plan for Air Quality Standards under Clean Air Act
- 2013 \$20M Settlement of Natural Resources Damage Claim-SRMT Lead Trustee
- 2016 Decommission and removal of Hogansburg Dam-return project lands to SRMT
- 2018 Agriculture Program establishes Tribal Farm on Blair Road
- 2019 Creation of the Remediation and Restoration Program
- 2019 Completion of SRMT oversight for in-river remediation of lower Grasse River
- 2020 SRMT & DEC agreement for co-coordination of Area of Concern restoration
- 2023 Transfer Station redesign and new Tipping House construction
- 2024 Environment Division moves to Teionkwarihwaienawa:kon CSB
